When Huy Pham says that 2008/2009 Administrative Coordinator Sarah Scales left big shoes for him to fill, no one is going to contradict him. But those of us who know Huy (think whoWHEE) through volunteer activity at Signature, Parklands or Gainesville Healthcare or from his participation at Friends board meetings can tell you that this is someone wearing big shoes of his own.

Huy is the guy whose hand shoots up when, at a board meeting, the question comes up of who can take on a task or a project. Huy is the guy who is visiting residents at not one or two but at three of the nursing homes where Friends sponsors volunteers. (He is also volunteer coordinator at Gainesville Healthcare.) And Huy is the guy who said "yes" when Friends needed a seamless transition from one Administrative Coordinator to the next.

A native of Riverview, Florida (south of Tampa) and recent graduate of the University of Florida with a BS in Microbiology and Cell Science, Huy is taking his MCATs at the end of March and hopes to enter medical school next year on a military scholarship. He says he has

always wanted to have a career in the military and that the hospital job he had in high school, where he met and talked with various doctors, was where he fell in love with medicine. His parents, who were among the

first wave of Vietnamese to come to the U.S. in 1975, are supportive of their son's ambitions. "But it's not because they want me to be a doctor," he says, "it's because they've always encouraged me to do what I want, to do what I love."

becoming a regular visitor to nursing homes, Huy has realized he wants to focus his medical career on the field of geriatrics. For the time being, he has gotten his training to be a Certified Nurse Aide, and he becomes impassioned as he talks about life in nursing homes. "When I operate the Friends volunteer booth on the UF campus, there are long lines of people volunteering to be Big Brothers and Big Sisters. That's great, but the elders need protection, too. The 'greatest generation' is in our nursing homes. What are they getting?"

You can see in her eyes that she lived her childhood with joy when she shares these anecdotes.
